Convocation transport

Wellington Airport-Wellington Railway Station-Waikanae Railway Station-El Rancho

For those arriving at Wellington Airport on 22 September, the new Airport Express (AX) runs between the terminal and the railway station every 10-20 minutes. The ride takes about 30 minutes. 50% fare reduction applies until 2023.

From there, trains depart for Waikanae every 20 minutes. The ride takes an hour. 50% fare reduction applies until 2023.

Arrival time at El Rancho, Waikanae, on 22 September is between 1pm and 4pm, with the Opening Eucharist starting at 4.30pm. Gubbio members will run a shuttle service between Waikanae Station and El Rancho on both 22 and 25 September or you might prefer a 90-minute walk. Important to let us know when you register! It will be great to see you all again!

Pacific Province Finances.

Every now and then there are a few queries re what happens to the donations you all make to tssf. I take this opportunity to remind you all that an annual contribution to tssf is part of being professed. This is a donation, not a due or subscription and is over to each individual as to how much you contribute. The guide for those who need that, is \$180 each year as on average that covers the expenses we have which I mention below. Some contribute much more and others less.

Firstly we contribute to the life of tssf globally by contributing to worldwide costs including legal and financial compliance. This contribution is based on the numbers of professed in each province. This includes the travel costs of the Ministers, the African travel fund and the 6 yearly Inter Provincial meeting for 3 representatives from each province to the UK meeting.

The same applies here where we reimburse the printing, postage, travel and zoom expenses of the minister, secretary, Tau editor, formation and lifelong formation directors and the treasurer. By doing this we support those in the enquire, postulants stages of their journey through the provision of formation documents and studies. Aotearoa region also supports the Solomon Islands region with some of their Chapter expenses, missions activity and getting their representatives to meetings.

The provincial website incurs ongoing costs to supply updated forms, lists and information which would otherwise need to be posted. For those who are not on the internet or require assistance, we post out printed copies of the address and intercession lists.

These lists are updated on the website monthly, hence if you print them off they may differ after some months of changes so there is no reason to have or use lists which are outdated by years. The ministers also check to make sure the daily headings for intercessions are up to date as this changes when provinces gain new tertiaries in new areas or geographic regions change.

As a province we organise and disperse the profession crosses and the "Principles In Plain English" booklet as a form of service for the global order.

This province also makes an annual contribution to the operating expenses of Franciscans International who work as advocates on behalf of the

marginalised and vulnerable.

We set aside amounts each year that build up over time to assist with travel between our regions for Chapter, new printings of books and the purchase of profession crosses.

Each year the treasurer reports to chapter and the Chapter minutes are loaded onto the website. They include the treasurers report if you would like to read through them.

I hope that helps clarify use of the funds donated and distributed.

Quotes from Corrie Ten Boom...

"You can never learn that Christ is all you need, until Christ is all you have."

GUBBIO/WELLINGTON AREA REPORT

What have the gentle Gubbio's been up to this year? Our programme was disrupted somewhat due to restrictions and sickness thanks to visits from Brother Covid-19 and Brother Omicron. But we all exercised patience and fortitude and enjoyed our meetings all the more. We have 14 professed members including Margaret who has returned from CMS work in PNG and five novices – plus two members of the Order of Ecumenical Franciscans (OEF) who are valued members of Gubbio. We have some who are very fragile and though unable to come to meetings they make an enormous contribution by their faithful prayers.

Gubbio met in January at St John's Church in Johnsonville and in June and July at St Aidan's, Miramar. We are very fortunate to have had both Maggie and Graeme celebrate for us and are very sorry indeed to farewell Maggie to the South Island. Using study notes compiled by novice Christopher, we studied, sometimes by email, Robyn Parkin's *Reflections on the Journey* and the Rev Canon Dr Jeff Golliher's reflections. In April, our Palmerston North and Silverstream members met at Rosemary's home for the Community Obedience, Study and lunch at a nearby café.

In August we hope to mark the Transitus of St Clare at chaplain Jenny's home, followed by a simple café lunch. We were delighted to welcome Penny Kennett who has moved to Wellington and to mark the recent engagement of Novice Sarah. We are very much looking forward to Convocation, coinciding with 800 years since St Francis founded the Third Order. Virginia will make us a banner, a vast improvement on the broom that was last carried! Also in October we hope to follow our practice of joining with the Secular

Franciscans at Holy Cross, Miramar, to mark the Transitus of St Francis and maybe in November we will have a Quiet Day. For our final service for the year we hope to join the Wellington Cathedral midday Eucharist as usual and then lunch together. Our next study sessions will be from *Franciscan Footprints* by Helen Julian CSF.

Following Francis

Saturday January 29 marked a significant milestone in my Franciscan journey – being admitted to the Novitiate of the Third Order Society of St Francis (known as the TSSF and its members as Tertiaries). It started with a colourful brochure, thrust into my hand at the 2019 Anglo-Catholic Hui asking me if I felt God was calling me to become a Third Order Franciscan. 'Is He? Me? Surely, not! No! Why Not? Well possibly', I argued with myself. For years I was feeling drawn to wanting to deepen my relationship with God and serve Him in a capacity beyond being a lay person in a parish church, but would I be 'good enough'? Being in a religious order while remaining in one's home and own community was a rather new concept to me at the time yet attractive and potentially doable as I wasn't prepared to renounce my cat Rupert. But the hui ended, I ventured into a new job before being thrust into lockdown and the brochure, since consigned to that pile of papers which somehow never get filed, was all but forgotten about for the next 19 months, although maybe not quite.

Several weeks of being forced to worship alone during the first 2020 lockdown increased my desire to be part of some sort of community, to live to a definite discipline and to be accountable for this. But surely I could do this anyway, I thought, and so I tried to discipline myself to say the Daily Offices or at least read the scripture passages for the day. Doing this alone was difficult and I didn't get very far. An online lecture on Radical Discipleship where the TSSF was described as 'the Anglican church's best kept secret' brought the Order to mind again so I fossicked through my now random mountain of (still unfiled) papers and found the brochure again.

I learned that St Francis of Assisi founded the Third Order in 1221 for those who felt called to live according to his Rule yet still living and working in the 'world'. While the First and Second Orders (Franciscans and Poor Clares respectively) take a literal vow of Poverty, Chastity (celibacy) and Obedience, Tertiaries, who include men and women, single and married, lay and ordained, promise to live according to the nine elements of the Rule (Eucharist, Penitence, Personal Prayer, Self-Denial, Retreat, Study, Simplicity, Work and Obedience) and additional principles: Humility, Chastity (really?), Love and Joy.

At first this appeared daunting and even rather scary as surely this proved that Orders were indeed for the holiest of holy types (not me!), but in April 2021 I picked up the phone and spoke to the Formation Director who referred me to

my Area Chaplain whose response was 'So you want to join our crazy bunch?' Crazy? Anglican.org.nz describes Francis as a:

mission preacher, lover of animals, ascetic, mystic, dramatic fool for Christ, happy singer, troubadour of God.

A collect from the same source asks God for 'something of his recklessness.' Plus of course Francis was a romantic figure who literally stripped himself 'naked following the naked Christ', a Robin Hood type hero, negotiator with the wolf of Gubbio and he wore the stigmata. To some he might have come across as crazy, but I immediately felt an affinity with Francis and if the Gubbio Group was indeed a crazy bunch then I was even more hopeful about fitting in. So, I become an Enquirer, (another pile of paper!); was assigned a Novice Counsellor and with some trepidation attended my first meeting in May 2021. To my relief and joy, everyone was friendly, appeared fairly normal and wore everyday clothes with the only distinguishing feature being the odd brown hoodie and the Profession cross. I immediately discerned that this was where I wanted to be and from there, I started working towards being accepted as a Postulant.

Tertiaries write their own version of the Rule and commit to keeping it for at least one year. I was also taught to view it as a support, rather like a trellis to help spiritual growth, and not a complex sort of obstacle course. Personal Rules of Life can be tweaked and even renegotiated to accommodate changes in circumstances or direction. My version of the Rule was accepted by the Formation Director and so I was officially a Postulant. Being a Postulant is an opportunity to test one's calling by keeping the Rule. In addition, I had to see a Spiritual Director, keep in touch with my Novice Counsellor and do a series of studies and write two quarterly reports.

It was a long and searching process forcing me to dig deep, adjust to living up to the Rule and saying the Community Obedience daily (not easy at first) especially due to not being able to see my Order for months due to ongoing Covid restrictions. Yet it had its rewards – especially where my prayer life has been concerned, and despite restrictions, I made new friends within the Gubbio group who are now like a family to me. Fast forward to December 2021 when I



submitted my last report and waited anxiously to hear back from my Novice Counsellor and, much to my joy, I got the email with subject line 'Novicing – full steam ahead' with the date – 29 January 2022 which still happened despite Red Traffic Light restrictions being announced less than one week earlier. This is not the end of the journey but another beginning as I have now started working towards Profession with even more studies, reports, and challenges but I know that this is definitely what I desire and with the help of God, Our Lady, St Francis, St Clare and everyone who has helped me to this stage, I will make it.

I would like to thank those at my own parish who prayed with me on Sunday January 30 and especially for the beautiful icon presented to me which I will always treasure and gaze at as I endeavour to follow the example of St Francis in my Christian walk.



The words attributed to St Francis: "Start by doing what's necessary; then do what's possible; and suddenly you are doing the impossible." took on new meaning for us recently.

Towards the end of 2018 in my impending retirement from full time ministry we visited the rural parish of Mangakuri Beach(Central Hawkes Bay) to take a service in the paddock Chapel belonging to Mangakuri Station... The old Mangakuri homestead, called Castlehill stood as guardian alongside it.

"It would be a great retreat home?" We commented to each other.

During 2019 after our time in Assisi the call for us to establish a hospitality space for pilgrims came clear. Castlehill was on the open market for sale when we returned so we investigated the possibility of purchasing it but discovered it was way out of our price range. The vendor eventually removed the property from the market.

In 2020, during a stay at St Isaac's, acting as relief kaitiaki, Rosemary had a vivid dream that we were in Castlehill. We decided to check out if it was available to buy praying for wide open doors if it was. This was during the second Covid lockdown. We wrote to the owner and posted it, hoping it would be a welcome change for him to receive a handwritten letter in his rural letterbox.

Arriving back in Hastings the owner invited us to visit him at Castlehill and share our vision over a coffee.. We explained to him our desire as TSSF Franciscans to establish a retreat . He shared that he liked living at Mangakuri and could be thinking of selling the homestead and a small amount of adjacent land but retaining the rest to build himself a new home on. The visit and discussion was encouraging and again we prayed. If this was God's will for us then let it be so. .

Out of the blue 2 months later a call from the owner saying <u>If he was to sell</u> we would have first option and this was the price.... Not negotiable! More prayer!

The housing market towards the end of 2021 was buoyant and we discovered the asking price was achievable if we sold our home and rental. We sought discernment from family and prayer partners. The result was a unanimous YES. So we took the plunge and when he said he would sell and offered us first choice, we said we would like to purchase the property.

During Labour Weekend we went for a trip out to Mangakuri Beach, and called by Castlehill. It was during that visit that the Scripture Matthew 13:45-46 was given to us. "The kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it."

This is what we did!

With the Castlehill owner heading overseas for 6 months on work commitments, we had plenty of time. Our home sold straight away, so for the next 6 months we took the opportunity to visit family and friends, house sit and "live simply."

The unconditional date arrived but we still needed half the asking price, as our rental had not sold.

In faith we paid the deposit praying God would honour us.

Friends in Timaru without seeing Castlehill, but aware of our journey, shared Isaiah 58: with us "The Lord will guide you continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones strong; and you shall be like a watered garden, like

a spring of water, whose waters never fail. Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in".

We were encouraged by these words. Settlement date (30 June) approached. Our rental still remained unsold. Three days before the due date, through a friend's generosity of a bridging loan, we were able to settle the purchase. There was great rejoicing and grateful thanks for our friends' provision. Rosemary and I picked up the keys

and "camped" in Castlehill's kitchen with the fire going for 2 nights before our furniture and belongings arrived. Our eclectic array of furniture fitted as if designed for the home. Our guests marvel at the peace and serenity of the place. We have tidied up the Chapel adjoining the homestead which the Station

Trust Board have granted permission for us to use as we see appropriate and be its kaitiaki.

The daffodils are now blooming and lambs are gamboling in the nearby paddocks. Castlehill has been gifted to us to care for and we will walk with God as we determine its future pathway to enable God's will to be done.

A Trinitarian approach to the climate crisis

News of people dying in disasters, the destruction of ecosystems, world leaders refusing to take meaningful action on global heating, make me cry and rage and lament and grieve.

My response to the climate crisis has always come from what I believe; it has a direct link to my Christian faith. Caring for the whole creation is rooted in the community of God in the three Persons of the Trinity.

Who is the God we worship? Psalm 113 declares that God is the Almighty One, whose glory is above the heavens, and yet its focus is that God raises the poor from the dust and lifts the needy from the ash heap. We worship a God of Justice who takes action to help the poor.

We see this throughout the Scriptures. In the Old Testament, God's words through the kings, prophets and laws all emphasise righteousness, love and compassion. It is also evident in Jesus' response to the question, 'Who is my neighbour?' in the parable of the Good Samaritan. He turns it on its head, implying 'You are the neighbour! So act accordingly with those close to you and those beyond your natural boundaries'. It is demonstrated, too, in the early church's practice of collecting money during a famine not only for their own poor, but those from other communities as well.

The environmental crisis is impacting the poorest most, in the UK and around the world. In 2013, tragically, a 9-year-old girl called Ella died. The coroner made a landmark ruling that a key cause of death was the choking pollution she lived with in inner-city London. Pollution, food deserts, lack of access to green spaces, and fuel poverty are just some of the issues facing the UK's poorest communities today.

If Covid-19 had not happened the biggest story of the last few years would undoubtedly have been the unfolding climate crisis: high temperatures, wildfires, floods, storms and droughts, all on an unprecedented scale. While the first lockdown did see global emissions drop by 7%, they have surged again. At

Tearfund we hear daily the consequences of the environmental crisis on those we serve.

We now turn to God the Son, Jesus Christ. Starting again with the Scriptures in Colossians 1:15-20, we discover Jesus as the Lord of All Creation. God the Son *in* whom and *through* whom and *for* whom everything was created: a powerful affirmation of the value of *all things*. The God of Justice calls us to care for the poor, but this passage asks more. The Lord of All Creation loves the *whole world*, not only people. Verse 20 declares that the cross has reconciled *all things* in heaven and on earth to God.

We see this elsewhere in the Scriptures. The Bible begins with God creating the heavens and the earth, all of which is 'very good'. The laws of the Old Testament like the jubilee and the sabbath were not only about people, but also the land and livestock. The prophets too held together righteousness, justice and the state of the land. The Psalms and the vision in Revelation celebrate this as well, where, as theologian Richard Bauckham describes, we are pictured as part of the worshipping 'community of creation'. We have been placed in this world, not separate from it, to be God's image here.

Covid itself is an environmental crisis, demonstrating the utterly broken relationship we have with the wider natural world. It is likely that it is a zoonotic virus (one that can jump between species) that has occurred because of our mistreatment of the earth. It is also probable that Ebola developed because of the destruction of the rainforest in DRC. This opens our eyes to deforestation, illegal trafficking and poaching of animals, the wet market trade, and many other terrible ways we are treating God's precious creation.

Our climate crisis is not only impacting people, but also causing ecosystem collapse and extinction at an unprecedented rate. My eldest daughter's Hawaiian boyfriend grew up diving amongst the island's coral reefs, seeing the growing devastation unfolding in these beautiful habitats of his homeland. A recent UN report found that 66% of marine environments and 75% of land environments have been changed because of us. I was struck watching David Attenborough's *Perfect Planet* programme that the world he saw as a young man has now changed beyond recognition. How terrible!

We turn now to God the Holy Spirit, beginning again in the Scriptures with Romans 8:19-25. This passage highlights the Spirit's eschatological role in God's creation, moving it towards its perfection in Christ (as outlined by the brilliant late theologian, Colin Gunton). This starts at the beginning as the Spirit hovers

over the waters, bringing order out of chaos, and continues through the Scriptural narrative - in the life and ministry of Jesus particularly - culminating with the vision of the future in Revelation, where the Spirit and the bride say 'Come'.

It is that new physical reality of the transformed heavens and earth, in which the wider natural world is fully present, that we are drawn towards and guaranteed through the Spirit. This keeps looking forward in anticipation to when the children of God will be revealed and the whole creation set free. As Catholic theologian, Peter Hocken, explains, 'The Spirit has been given both as the first fruits and as the hope of liberation, and we are stretched between the two'.

Don't we feel that stretching so much?! There are many wonderful, enjoyable things in this life, and yet I am not comfortable here. News of people dying in disasters, the destruction of ecosystems, world leaders refusing to take meaningful action on global heating, make me cry and rage and lament and grieve. I long for a different reality and know that I must faithfully and patiently work towards that despite these things.

The Spirit's work in our lives enables this, helping us to pray in our weakness, giving us hope, causing us to bear fruit and exercise supernatural gifts. Looking towards the future, we know that our work is not in vain, because we have the promise that, with the Spirit, our efforts will, somehow, be seen in the age to come.

So let us keep working, rooted in the Trinitarian God: our God of Justice, the Lord of All Creation, and the eschatological Spirit who keeps us moving forwards in hope.

How is NZ being affected by climate change?

Sea-level rise is caused by melting of the polar ice caps, as well as expansion of ocean water as it warms. In New Zealand, the sea may rise by up to a metre by the end of the century. This will mean more coastal erosion and flooding, which will damage homes and infrastructure like pipes and roads.

Rising sea levels are a big risk for New Zealand – the country has just published a national plan to tackle this and other climate threats. Globally, sea levels could rise another foot by 2050, warn scientists. Countries are introducing measures including early warning systems, sea walls and surge barriers.

How are the Solomon Islands being affected by climate change?

Pacific islands are extremely vulnerable to climate change. The most substantial impacts of climate change include losses of coastal infrastructure and land, more intense cyclones and droughts, failure of subsistence crops and coastal fisheries, losses of coral reefs and mangroves, and the spread of certain diseases.

Sea-level rise, the increased frequency and severity of extreme weather events, increasing air and sea surface temperatures, floods and protracted droughts, coastal erosion, salt water intrusion, and salinization are threatening island economies and habitats.
